## KIWI IN WHAKATANE

In 1999 a few kiwi were discovered in Ohope Scenic Reserve. There was no predator control occurring, but somehow the adult kiwi had survived! Numbers have now increased through the Whakatane Kiwi Project. Eggs are removed from nests to prevent chick predation and transferred to Rotorua's Kiwi Encounter. Here the chicks hatch and grow until large enough to fend off most predators. Juvenile kiwi are returned to Ohope, Mokorua, Kohi Point and Waitotane Scenic Reserves or predator - free Moutohora (Whale Is).

To further protect kiwi:

- Stoats, ferrets and cats are controlled in all reserves mentioned above.
- Moutohora, Kohi Point, Mokorua and Ohope Scenic Reserves are designated 'No Dog' zones and
- Kiwi aversion training is promoted to help prevent dogs killing kiwi in the wider Whakatane area.



## THE DISTRICT

The Whakatane Kiwi Project presently works on reserve lands including Ohope, Mokorua, Moutohora, Kohi Point and Waitotane Scenic Reserves. New initiatives include extending predator control and managing 'kiwi hot spots' on private land.
